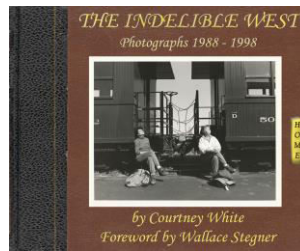
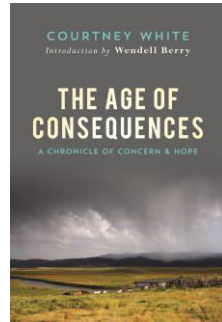


## Courtney White



A former archaeologist and Sierra Club activist, Courtney White dropped out of the ‘conflict industry’ in 1997 to cofound the Quivira Coalition, a nonprofit conservation organization dedicated to building a radical center among ranchers, conservationists, public land managers, scientists and others around practices that improve economic and ecological resilience in western working landscapes. He served as Executive Director of Quivira for nearly fifteen years before becoming its Creative Director.

His work focused on solutions to food, water, and climate challenges, embracing progressive cattle management, collaborative conservation, riparian restoration, land health, local food, grassfed meat, soil carbon, resilience, and regenerative agriculture. In 2016, he left Quivira in order to concentrate on writing and a new project titled *This Moment In Time*.

Born in Philadelphia, Courtney grew up in Phoenix, earned a B.A. from Reed College and attended UCLA’s graduate school in filmmaking. He worked as an archaeologist for Arizona State University and the National Park Service. He moved to Santa Fe, NM, in 1992.

In 2005, Wendell Berry included Courtney’s essay *The Working Wilderness* in his collection *The Way of Ignorance*, an endorsement that set Courtney on a path of writing that has led to many published articles and books.

He is the author of *Revolution on the Range* (Island Press), *Grass, Soil, Hope* (Chelsea Green), *The Age of Consequences* (Counterpoint Press) and *2% Solutions for the Planet* (Chelsea Green). He is currently working on a new book titled *The Threshold*. He lives in Santa Fe with his family, one dog and two chickens.

### **My mission: creative responses to scientific questions**

I’ve been creating ‘right-brain’ responses to ‘left-brain’ questions since I was thirteen years old, when a long summer road trip through Mexico lit a fire that has never gone out. I express my answers in writing, photography, speaking and activism, endeavoring in each to tell honest and compelling stories.

I have worked on the cutting edge of collaborative conservation, regenerative agriculture, ecological restoration, and climate mitigation for two decades. As Executive Director of the Quivira Coalition, I had the privilege to help implement these practices as well as explain their hopefulness in numerous publications and public speaking events.

I have come to believe that telling important stories in inspiring ways is critical to our collective future. As our challenges grow in size and complexity, we urgently need as many ‘right-brain’ answers to ‘left-brain’ questions as we can muster.
